The Wisdom to Know the Difference

Perhaps much of the stress and anxiety we carry each day is the result of our wanting to control situations, or to help some unwilling to be helped person around us. This is especially true of those nearest and dearest to us. We wade into the business of their lives and believe if we can only redirect their thoughts and actions, things would be better for them. If only they would listen to us, life would not be so difficult for them. We impose well-intended expectations, and become angry and hurt when they fail to fulfill them. We are often sucked into trying to help, rescue, or fix other people when their desire is not to get better, but to simply garner another's attention, either positive or negative.

Both Christian spirituality and psychology remind us that there is only one person in life we have the power to change, and that is ourselves. Sometimes we meddle in other person's affairs as a way of avoiding this truth. It is much "safer" to see the speck in our brother's or sister's eye than to look honestly at the log in our own. That which we criticize in others is often the very thing we would do well to address in our own hearts.

We must cultivate an ability to know the difference between what (or who) we can, and cannot, change in life. We can certainly be witnesses to others, and seek through the choices we make to positively influence them. But the power to authentically change lives is the work of God's Holy Spirit alone. When we mistakenly believe we possess such power, we are tip-toeing into the realms of delusion and idolatry. This realization can be very freeing to those of us who too often assume responsibility for others. We are only responsible for our own life: our choices, our behaviors, and the boundaries we set, so as not to be overwhelmed by the actions of people over whom we have no control.

May we trust in the Holy One to work God's redemptive and life-giving work in the lives of these others. May we invite this Presence into our own lives, and have the desire and courage to be profoundly changed in the process. This transformation is the work the Good Shepherd was all about. May each of us experience a transformative moment in our own hearts, when we are given that gift of wisdom in knowing the difference between who and what we can, and cannot,

change.

This blessing was offered by a character that Robert Duval played in the movie "Seven Days in Utopia".




SHROVE TUESDAY PANCAKE SUPPER FEBRUARY 25TH

The operating fund ended the year with a balance of \$44,308. The surplus will bolster our operating fund as we head into the search process to call a full time priest later in 2020. Flu viruses survive best when humidity is lowest, which usually means winter. And cold viruses may multiply more efficiently when temperatures in nasal cavities (in mice, anyway)go below 98.6 F. Also, cold weather often forces us indoors- into climate-controlled, low-humidity buildings and close to potentially infected people.

2. True

Most flu cases usually appear in February, and the season often extends well into March.

3. False

There's no evidence that antibacterial soaps work better than regular soap and water at preventing a cold or the flu. And overuse of these soaps may contribute to the spread of antibiotic- resistant bacteria. For that reason, the FDA ordered manufacturers to stop using 19 antibacterial agents in the soaps... Consumer Reports says, be safe and stick with regular soap and water. CDC says if you're going to use hand sanitizers, get Purell or Germ-X which is 60% alcohol.

4. True

Most are contagious for a day or so before their symptoms become apparent. The risk of spreading the disease tends to diminish along with the symptoms, though you can be contagious for more than a week. So wash your beautiful hands and use your sleeve to cough into.

5. False

Staying home with a cold is a good idea if possible, but it's not as important as it is for the flu. For on e thing, colds are less likely to trigger serious complications, so they don't require as many precautions, The flu, on the other hand, is both more dangerous and more debilitating, which makes staying home essential for you- and those around you.
